



WILL AND TESTAMENT



One painful lesson learned in New York City on September 11 is that many families put off the making of a will and without this necessary legal document, it becomes the courts decision on how to dispose of the deceased property. Often the results are nothing near what the deceased had hoped.

In order that everyone can have a will, the COACB has made special arrangements with Attorney Steven Chaffin for him to be at TV39 on February 15, 2002 to prepare basic wills for those needing them. There is no charge for the basic will but if a more complex document is desired, a small fee may be charged.

The Attorney will also give advise as to how to avoid Probate and other planning that can be done to avoid any problems related to long term illness and the transfer of assets following the passing of a loved one. One example, is executing a Deed known as a Survivorship Deed. This allows real estate to be transferred to a surviving spouse without the necessity of filing a formal Probate proceeding. Another example is establishing a joint bank account with your spouse or other family members and include rights of survivorship. These simple planning devises can save you time, money and take some worry out of the process.



GRANDMOTHER'S COCONUT CAKE

¾ cup crisco; 2 cups sugar; 1½ teaspoons vanilla; ½ teaspoon almond extract; 3 cups sifted flour; 3 teaspoons baking powder; pinch of salt; 1 cup milk; 6 egg whites

Soften crisco, gradually add sugar and flavoring. Sift flour, baking powder and salt and add alternately to sugar mixture with milk ending with flour. Add egg whites, one at a time and beat well. Pour into three paper lined and greased 9" cake pans. Bake in 350 degree oven for 25 minutes. Cool and spread coconut icing between layers and then ice the entire cake .

COCONUT ICING

2 cups sugar; 2 coconuts peeled and grated; 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten; ¾ cup liquid (½ water, ½ coconut milk); 6 large marshmallows; 1 tablespoon light corn syrup; ½ teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon almond extract.

Cook sugar, liquid and corn syrup, over low heat stirring till sugar is dissolved. Cover 2 to 3 minutes, then uncover and cook till candy thermometer reads 238 degrees.

Add marshmallows and beat. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and ½ grated coconut, add flavoring. Ice between layers. Insert toothpicks to hold layers while icing top. Sprinkle remaining coconut over icing and gently press in while hot. Cool and refrigerate.

OREO COOKIE PIE

1 1/2 cups milk; 1 small instant Vanilla pudding; mix for 1 minute (let set for 5 minutes). Crush 10 - 12 cookies, 1-8 oz. cool whip.

Mix all the above together. Spoon into a graham cracker crust and freeze for 5-6 hours.

CARROT CAULIFLOWER CASSEROLE

1-10 ounce package frozen cauliflower; ¼ tsp salt; ½ cup processed American cheese, grated; 1 small can condensed cream of chicken soup, undiluted. 1-10 ounce package frozen carrots.

Cook cauliflower and carrots according to directions on package. Drain. Arrange cauliflower in baking pan, add salt. Top with half the cheese. Spoon ½ of the soup over pan. Top with carrots, remaining cheese and soup. Sprinkle with paprika.

Bake at 375 degrees for 35-45 minutes.

Serves 5.
