RECORDING STUDIO

The COACB is now in the process of setting up a multi-channel recording studio at its Marion facility. The system an ECHO LAYLA can handle up to 96 tracks. The capabilities of this system are phenomenal. Up to eight tracks at a time can be recorded. Individual tracks can be replaced or rerecorded without disturbing others. Engineers can provide multiple layers of sound each with individual mixes to achieve the sound desired by the performers or their managers.

How often have you heard performers say that everything was perfect except for maybe one person who went a little flat? Instead of re-recording everything, that one person puts on earphones and does only his part again while listening to the rest of the group through his earphones. Also it is possible to go back add additional instruments. In theory, one person can play ever instrument heard on the recording playing and recording one instrument at a time. With 96 tracks it is unbelievable what can be done.

Once the installation is completed, Gospel Groups can travel to the Marion facility for access to recording technology that is currently available only in large cities. Groups can also choose to use a COACB recording engineer or they can use to use their own sound engineer.





Try These Recipes

ANGEL LUSH WITH PINEAPPLE

RETA RUTHERFORD

1 package (4 serving size) Jello Vanilla flavor instant pudding and pie filling (I use sugar free pudding); 1 can (20 oz.) crushed pineapple in juice, undrained; 1 cup thawed cool whip whipped topping; 1 package (10 oz.) prepared round angel food cake; 10 small strawberries.

Mix dry pudding mix and pineapple with juice in a medium bowl. Gently stir in whipped topping. Cut cake horizontally into 3 layers. Place bottom cake layer, cut side up on serving place. Spread 1 1/3 cups of the pudding mixture onto cake layer; cover with middle cake layer; Spread 1 cup of the pudding mixture onto middle cake layer; top with remaining cake layer. Spread with remaining pudding mixture. Refrigerate at least 1 hour or until ready to serve. Makes 10 servings.

APRICOT SALAD

CAROLYN AIKEN

1 can 20 oz crushed pineapple & juice; 2 small pkgs apricot jello; 2 cups buttermilk; 1 12 oz container whipped topping

Heat pineapple to a boil. Stir in Jello and let cool to room temperature. Fold in buttermilk and whipped topping. Blend well and refrigerate.

EASY CHOCOLATE ICE CREAM

ANONYMOUS

Use your blender to thoroughly combine the cocoa into the cream. Be sure to stir in the whipping cream by hand.

2 cups half-and-half cream; 1-1/2 cups sugar; 1/2 cup baking cocoa; 1 teaspoon vanilla extract; 2 cups whipping cream

Combine half-and-half, sugar, cocoa and vanilla in a blender; cover and process on low until smooth. Stir in whipping cream. Freeze in an ice cream freezer according to manufacturer's instructions. Allow to ripen in ice cream freezer or firm up in your refrigerator freezer 2-4 hours before serving. Yield: 1-1/2 quarts.

ORANGE FRUIT SALAD

1-16 ounce carton cottage cheese; 1-3 ounce package orange jello; 1 small container cool whip; 1 can mandarin oranges-drained.

Whip cottage cheese. Add package of jello till smooth in blender. Beat in cool whip till well mixed. Fold in oranges. Chill and serve.

PEACH CUSTARD

One (1) unbaked pie crust; 2 cups sliced ripe peaches; 3 beaten eggs; 1 cup sugar; 2 tablespoons butter; Cinnamon

Put peaches in pie crust. Beat eggs and sugar and pour over peaches. Sprinkle with cinnamon and dot with butter. Bake 10 minutes in 400 degree oven. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake 35 minutes.


