COACB BUYS DVD BURNER GOSPEL SINGINGS



From the beginning of television, there has always been the need to record information for later broadcast. Television stations have used photographs, movie film, video tape, and computer hard drives, and all of these have many draw backs. Photographs and film had to be developed and printed before using. This was very time consuming and until the process was completed, station personnel could only hope that they would have something to work with. Film crews used to say their lead story went out with the wash, meaning they lost the film in processing.

The introduction of video tape made life much easier for TV production crews. Material could be played back immediately to see if the crew needed to do another take, but there were still problems with video tape. It took a long time to rewind the tapes, and there were dropouts, tapes broke, and machines jammed. Only a control room operator can describe the agony when a player eats a tape just minutes before air time.

Recording to computer hard drives has many advantages over tape, but computers do crash and some times they just seem to have a way of hiding the file in the wrong place on a massive hard drive.

The COACB recently bought a DVD-RAM Recorder. This technology uses a laser to burn data onto the recordable disk. Up to 4.7 giga-bytes of data can be recorded on one disk—that's 2 hours of high quality video. A big advantage for this technology is that a player has instant access to any portion of the recorded material, and some recorders can even play back previously recorded tracks even as it is recording new material. The COACB has purchased one DVD burner and several DVD players and is just starting to use this new technology. Maybe DVD-R technology will be the fix-all solution broadcasters are looking for.



LADY BALTIMORE CAKE

Thelma Aiken

½ cup butter; 1½ cups sugar; 1 cup water;
3 cups sifted cake flour; 2½ teaspoons
baking powder; ¼ teaspoon almond extract;
½ teaspoon vanilla flavoring;
4 egg whites; ½ teaspoon salt.

Cream butter and sugar. Sift together dry ingredients. Add alternately with water to the creamed mixture. Add flavorings. Beat 3 minutes. Then add beaten egg whites and bake in 3 layers in 350 degree oven until test done. Set in pans 5 to 10 minutes. Take out, cool, fill and ice.

FILLING

Grind ½ pound figs; ½ pound raisins; ½ pound pecans or walnuts, set aside.

BOILED ICING

2 cups sugar; ½ cup water; 2 egg whites.

Boil sugar and water, without stirring until it threads from a spoon. Stir in stiffly beaten egg whites. Beat until stiff enough to spread. Take out 1/3 cup, and into the rest, stir in the ground mixture. Spread between layers and on top. Over the sides spread the remaining 1/3 white icing.

HOBO STEW

15 oz. can creamed corn; 15 oz. can green beans
15oz can sweet peas; 15 oz. can diced tomatoes;
5 oz. can chunked white chicken;
1 package of instant Ramen noodles

This is a really quick and easy meal to fix. Just open all the cans and pour the contents in a cooker. Heat to the serving temperature. Season to taste with Louisiana Hot Sauce and call everyone for some really good eatin'. **Serves 6**
