## COACB MICRO-COMPUTER

**I** had CS Microsystems in Carson City, Nevada develop an inexpensive single chip micro-computer for use in COACB stations.

The prototype has been delivered and it is quite impressive. Each allows remote reading of up to eight meters and remote control of eight station functions. It also monitors and reports the status of up to eight additional alarms circuits. Communication functions are included so COACB personnel can use these micro-computers to monitor or control equipment from anywhere in the world.

Even when on vacation, I call daily to check on the stations. I also frequently make emergency trips to reset critical equipment. Those calls and trips may soon be a thing of the past. Soon, just a trip to the closest computer that has an internet connection, will allow me to log onto any of the micro-computers to see the status of all station functions and remote reset or control equipment. Each micro-computer along with its software costs less than \$75.



### OLD FASHIONED JAM CAKE

2½ cups flour; 1 cup sugar; 1/3 cup un-sweetened cocoa; 1 teaspoon baking soda; 1 teaspoon cinnamon; 1 teaspoon nutmeg; ½ teaspoon cloves; 1 cup butter, softened; 4 eggs; 1 jar (12 ounces) or 1 cup blackberry jam; 2/3 cup buttermilk; 1 cup chopped pecans; 1 cup raisins; 1 can (8 ounces) crushed pineapple, un-drained;

Soak raisins in pineapple for several hours or overnight. Sift together dry ingredients; set aside. In a large mixing bowl, cream butter. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add jam and buttermilk; blend well. Add dry ingredients; mix just until all ingredients are combined. Stir in raisin/pineapple mixture and nuts. Spread into two greased and floured 9 inch cake pans.

Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes or until cakes test done. Cool ten minutes before removing from pans to cool on a wire rack.

### CARAMEL ICING

1 cup butter or margarine; 2 cups packed brown sugar; ½ cup milk; 3½ to 4 cups sifted confectioners' sugar.

Melt butter over medium heat. Stir in sugar and milk. Bring to a boil. Remove from heat; cool until just warm. With an electric mixer, beat in enough of the confectioners' sugar until a spreading consistency is reached. Frost cooled

### APPLE BUTTERSCOTCH CAKE

1 cup Wesson oil; 2 cups sugar; 3 eggs; 2½ cups flour; 1 teaspoon soda; 1 teaspoon baking powder; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon cinnamon; 3 cups apples, peeled and diced; 1 package (6 oz.) butterscotch morsels.

Mix together oil, sugar, and eggs. Add dry ingredients and mix again. Mixture will be thick. Stir in apples. You can put the morsels in the mixture or on top of cake. Bake in greased 9x13 inch pan for 50 to 60 minutes 350 degrees. Needs no frosting.
